SIM Update: DHCF Solicits Feedback on Provider Survey

DHCF is requesting feedback from District health care providers. Consumer Interviews Conducted at Pathways to Housing DC

This week, DHCF conducted one-on-one interviews at Pathways to Housing DC. The organization serves thousands of individuals who are homeless or at risk for homelessness in the District. As previously mentioned, the findings from the consumer engagement activities will be used to inform D.C.'s State Innovation Health Plan (SHIP) under SIM. The SHIP will describe the strategies and methods proposed to transform the structure and performance of the District's entire health system. DHCF appreciates all of the partners that have helped to coordinate consumer interviews to date, including Unity Health Care, Mary's Center, George Washington University Hospital, and Providence Hospital.

CMS Finalizes Rule on Mental Health Substance Use Disorder Parity for Medicaid and CHIP

On March 29, 2016, the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) finalized a rule to strengthen access to mental health and substance use services for people with Medicaid or Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) coverage, aligning with protections already required of private health plans. The Mental Health Parity and Addiction Equity Act of 2008 generally requires that health insurance plans treat mental health and substance use disorder benefits on equal footing as medical and surgical benefits. The final rule is available in the Federal Register, and more information on behavioral health services in Medicaid and CHIP can be found here.

HHS Proposes Changes to the Rules Governing the Confidentiality of Substance Use Disorder Records: Comments due April 11, 2016

The Health and Human Services Department proposed changes that would facilitate health information exchange to support delivery system reform efforts while protecting the privacy of patients seeking treatment for a substance use disorder. The goal of the proposed changes is to facilitate information exchange within new health care models while addressing the legitimate privacy concerns of patients seeking treatment for a substance use disorder. CDC Launches 6|18 Initiative: Accelerating Evidence into Action Brings Together Public and Private Players

The **Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC)** *6/18 Initiative: Accelerating Evidence into Action* is bringing together public and private health care purchasers, payers, and providers to improve health and control health care costs. This innovative effort aims to link prevention to health coverage and delivery with a focus on six high-burden, high-cost health conditions -- tobacco use, high blood pressure, health care-associated infections, asthma, unintended pregnancies, and diabetes. The President of the **Center for Health Care Strategies, Stephens Somers**, authored a blog titled "New Waves of Opportunity for Medicaid." In the blog post, Somers highlights three opportunities to further preventive and integrated care for those served by Medicaid, including broad prevention, upstream prevention and intervention for young families, and downstream intervention for high-need, high-cost adult populations. Somers acknowledges that health care interventions only account for a modest portion of health outcomes, and as a result, the social determinants of health must be addressed. CHCS's Brief on Trauma-Informed Care

The **Center for Health Care Strategies** published a new brief titled "Trauma-Informed Care: Opportunities for High-Need, High-Cost Medicaid Populations." This is the first in a series of resources from Advancing Trauma-Informed Care, a multi-site demonstration project supported by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation and led by the Center for Health Care Strategies. The brief outlines a practical framework for implementing clinical and organizational practices in health care settings to address the complex impact that trauma has on patients and providers. It explores opportunities for improving care, reducing health care costs for individuals with histories of trauma, and incorporating trauma-informed principles throughout the health care organization.
